

[Keynote Speakers

Béatrice Longuenesse



Professor Emerita of Philosophy at New York University, Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Her current work spans the history of philosophy, especially Kant and 19th century German philosophy. Her books include *Kant and the Capacity to Judge* (1998); *Kant on the Human Standpoint* (2005); *Hegel's Critique of Metaphysics* (2007); *I, Me, Mine. Back to Kant, and Back again* (2017).

Paul Guyer



Professor Emeritus of Humanities and Philosophy at Brown University and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His interests include all areas of the philosophy of Kant and modern philosophy more generally. Author of thirteen books on Kant, including *Kant and the Claims of Taste* (1979); *Kant and the Claims of Knowledge* (1987); *Knowledge, Reason, and Taste: Kant's Response to Hume* (2008); *Kant on the Rationality of Morality* (2019); *Reason and Experience in Mendelssohn and Kant* (2020).

Mircea Flonta



Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at the University of Bucharest, member of the Romanian Academy. His main area of interest is epistemology, with contributions in the philosophy of biology, Kantian studies, and philosophy of science. His books include *Necessary Truths? A Monographic Study on Analyticity* (1975); *Philosophical Perspective and Scientific Reason: Philosophical Presuppositions in Exact Science* (1985); *Images of Science* (1994); *Kant in His World and in Ours* (2005).

Eric Watkins



Professor at the University of California, San Diego. His primary area of research is Kant (pre-Critical period, metaphysics and epistemology, philosophy of science, and practical philosophy). He also has significant interests in early modern philosophy (Leibniz, Newton, and Hume) and German Idealism (Reinhold, Fichte, Schelling, and Hegel) as well as in the history of philosophy of science. Among his books: *Kant and the Metaphysics of Causality* (2005); *Kant on Laws* (2019).

Ilie Pârvu



Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at the University of Bucharest, member of the Romanian Academy. His interests lie in the fields of philosophy of science, metaphysics, Kantian studies, formal ontology, history and foundations of physics.

Among his books: *Semantics and Logic of Science* (1974); *The Scientific Theory* (1981); *Possibility of Experience: A Theoretical Reconstruction of the Critique of Pure Reason* (2004).

Dietmar Heidemann



Professor at the Institute of Philosophy, University of Luxembourg, editorial board member of *Kant Yearbook*, *Kant-Studien* and *Kant Studies Online*. His research focuses on epistemology, analytical philosophy, philosophy of mind, metaphysics, Kant, Hegel, German idealism. His books include: *Kant und das Problem des Metaphysischen Idealismus* (1998); *Join or Die. Philosophical Foundation of Federalism* (2016); *Kant and Non-Conceptual Content* (2013).

Michael Potter



Professor of Logic at Cambridge University and a Life Fellow of Fitzwilliam College. His research interests lie mainly in the history of analytic philosophy (in particular Frege, Russell, Wittgenstein and Ramsey), the philosophy of mathematics, and philosophical logic. His works on Kant are related to Kant's transcendentalism and philosophy of mathematics. These include *Reason's Nearest Kin: Philosophies of Arithmetic from Kant to Carnap* (2000).

Hernán Pringe



Senior researcher at CONICET-UBA (National Scientific and Technical Research Council, Argentina), professor at Universidad Diego Portales, Santiago de Chile. His main areas of research: Neo-Kantianism, Kant, philosophy of physics. Among his books: *Critique of the Quantum Power of Judgment. A Transcendental Foundation of Quantum Objectivity* (2007); *Diccionario de la filosofía crítica kantiana* (2017, co-author); *Investigaciones kantianas* (2018).

Bryan Hall



Professor, Vice Provost for Strategic Programs at Regis University, Denver (Colorado). His books include: *The Post-Critical Kant. Understanding the Critical Philosophy through the Opus Postumum* (2015); *The Post-Critical Kant* (2014); *The Arguments of Kant's Critique of Pure Reason* (2010). Among his articles: "A Dilemma for Kant's Theory of Substance" (2010); "Hume and Kant on Space, Divisibility, and Antinomical Conflict" (2017).

Christian Onof



Honorary Research Fellow in the Department of Philosophy at Birkbeck College, University of London. His philosophical research focuses on Kant's transcendental idealism. Particular areas of interest are: Kant's understanding of space, transcendental freedom, schematism, the in-itself, the self. In his forthcoming book, *The Problem of Free Will and Naturalism* (2024), he argues that the possibility of freedom and problems inherent to naturalism both require the adoption of transcendental idealism.

Fabrice Pataut



Research Fellow at French National Centre for Scientific Research (CNRS). His areas of interest: philosophy of language, philosophy of mathematics, philosophy of logic. Author of the volume *Realism, Decidability and the Past* (1996). Among his articles: "Kantian Versions of Benacerraf's Dilemma: Comments on a Suggestion of Charles Parsons" (2013); "Verifiability, Scientific Realism and Constructive Empiricism" (2008); "Strong Antirealism, Logical Rules and Structural Rules" (2011).
